Training Saves Lives

Gus and his sister Gale were 8 weeks old when they came to NHA with what appeared to be chemical burns on their paws. Since dogs depend on their paws for balance, stability, traction, and shock absorption, these injuries were challenging for the young pups. In addition to physical issues, Gus struggled with behavioral concerns. Although he was smart and learned quickly, he easily became overstimulated, leading to mouthy behaviors when he wanted to play or didn't like something. Gus was mouthy on that he preferred his foster's body to toys. It wasn't intentional as he hadn't had an opportunity to learn from his mom or other dogs and was easily overstimulated.

That's when Gus' foster, Courtney J. came to the rescue and started him on GoodPup, an online training program designed to accommodate busy schedules. NHA had the opportunity to offer the program, free of cost, to allow her to improve on Gus' troublesome behaviors. With 8 years of experience handling a reactive dog, Courtney had a deep understanding of dog behavior and was ready for the challenge. However, Gus presented new challenges. Partaking in the GoodPup program proved invaluable as Gus' trainer observed their interactions, pinpointing Gus' mouthiness. The trainer offered effective strategies to redirect Gus and teach impulse control, suitable for various levels of overstimulation. These tactics made a significant impact on Gus' behavior. By the time Gus found a permanent home, his mouthiness had decreased, and he displayed more typical puppy behavior. GoodPup truly gave Gus a second chance, preparing him to be the ULTIMATE forever companion, thanks to the dedication of his foster and the program's support.


Foster Fails, Happy Tails
